Mission

StreetSquash provides consistent, long-term and reliable support to the children, families and schools in Harlem. By exposing these children to a broad range of experiences and by maintaining the highest standards, StreetSquash aims to help each child realize his or her academic and personal potential.

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Dear Friends,

If you've ever visited StreetSquash and seen the students in the classrooms and on the courts, it's pretty easy to be swept up in positive feelings; children studying hard, competing on court and supporting one another. You see staff pushing kids to be their best, volunteers giving their time and energy to make a difference, and families taking advantage of the many resources StreetSquash has to offer. Put simply, it is easy to fall in love with the program.

Simply feeling good about the work we are doing, however, is not enough. How do we determine if we are in fact making a concrete impact on our students' lives and meeting the outcomes we hope to achieve? Are they graduating high school, going to college and earning a degree at meaningfully higher rates than their peers? Is StreetSquash spending its resources in the most efficient way possible? Are we well positioned for the long term? How can we impact more students?

These are the questions that keep us up at night and motivate everyone on the StreetSquash team to keep working to be better. While there is always room for improvement, we are deeply proud of what we, together, have achieved over the last 18 years.

Results

StreetSquash students are achieving academic success at a significantly higher rate than their peers. While 100% of StreetSquash participants graduate from high school, 71% of their classmates from the same schools graduate. In terms of college matriculation, 96% of StreetSquash students enroll in college, compared to 60% from their peer group.

Of StreetSquash alumni, 85% have graduated college or are on track to do so, compared with the national average of 14% from the same demographic (2016 study from the National Center for Education Statistics).

In other words, a 6th grade student who enters StreetSquash is 10 times more likely to earn a college degree than his or her peers from the same middle school. And, as countless studies have shown, there is great economic advantage to having a college degree; the pay gap between college graduates and everyone else is at an all time high, where those with a 4-year college degree earned 98% more an hour on average in 2013 than those without a degree. (*Is College Worth it? Clearly New Data Say*, New York Times, May 27, 2014)

Efficiency

We understand that when people make a donation to StreetSquash, they expect that the bulk of their dollars will go towards supporting children and young adults, rather than on administrative costs. We work diligently to keep our fundraising costs down; for this year's StreetSquash Cup, we raised \$1.1 million, spending only 2.7% of the dollars raised on event expenses.

Sustainability

StreetSquash has forever been about long-term work and commitment to all our participants. With a \$9 million permanent facility in Harlem, we have become an important fixture in this community. In order to remain a stable and responsive organization, StreetSquash needs to be on solid

TINDAKAY, CLASS OF 2019

Tindakay joined StreetSquash in September 2014. "My first day I met my academic and squash directors and they were so nice and welcoming. I wanted to come back every single day, as much as I could." Despite describing herself as quiet and shy, Tindakay felt right at home.

Tindakay's first year at StreetSquash she remained somewhat reserved. She participated when asked, but would rarely take initiative to get involved in opportunities outside of her regular academic and squash sessions.

As Tindakay began her second year in the program, she participated in a goal-setting meeting with her academic and squash directors. They asked her about her goals for the future in the program and beyond, and how StreetSquash could help her accomplish these goals. Tindakay said she wanted to improve her self-confidence. She wanted to speak up more, meet new people, and expand her horizons.

Following the meeting, Tindakay's involvement improved and her participation expanded across the board. "I realized that the more I come here, the more I will get out of it." Beyond attending her academic, squash and college prep sessions 4 times a week, she began to come on her "off" days for peer mentoring, volunteering and leadership opportunities.

In an effort to improve her self-confidence and reach her personal goal to speak out more, Tindakay ran for the secretary position on the Student Leadership Council. Tindakay stayed up all night writing and practicing her speech to the members of SLC, who would vote to elect the secretary.

Tindakay was among five StreetSquash students to run for the position, and ultimately did not win. Rather than being discouraged, Tindakay immediately offered to stay involved. "I told them if they ever need help with anything that I am here," she recalled.

Tindakay also serves as a mentor for her StreetSquash mentee, Roche, Class of 2022. "I love her so much," Tindakay raved. "I try to visit her in her academic sessions and squash sessions at least once a week. I help her with her homework or on court. I just love to help people."

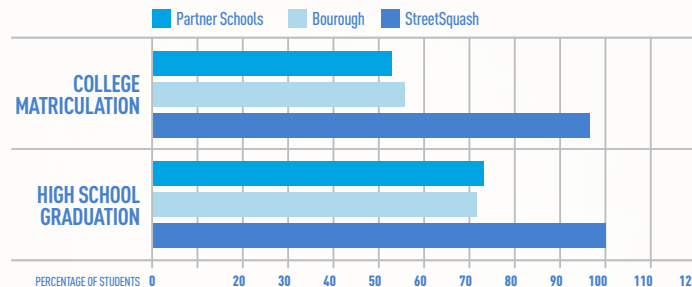
In addition to becoming more outgoing, Tindakay set another goal for herself at StreetSquash: to receive the StreetSquasher of the Year award at the annual End of the Year Awards Ceremony. This award is given to a student who takes advantage of all opportunities, and who best embodies the qualities valued at StreetSquash: leadership, sportsmanship, teamwork, generosity and concern for others.

With this new goal in mind, Tindakay signed up for every opportunity - squash, academic, college prep, community service - with eagerness and an incredibly positive and resilient attitude. She challenged herself at StreetSquash, not letting distractions get in the way of learning new skills and giving her best effort. In June, at the end of her second year in the program, Tindakay stood in front of her family, peers and StreetSquash staff as her name was announced as the StreetSquasher of the Year. "It was the most proud I have ever been."

The qualities that make Tindakay the wonderful person she is would endure with or without the help of StreetSquash. What makes Tindakay's story noteworthy, is that StreetSquash provided a catalyst for Tindakay to grow, to set goals, to give back, and to expand her horizons. StreetSquash is a place where Tindakay, and hundreds of other participants, can and will achieve their full potential.

Weekly Sessions:

All students in grades 9 - 10 participate in a minimum of 75 minutes of college prep per week. All students in grades 11 - 12 participate in a minimum of 120 minutes of college prep per week.

Standardized Test Prep:

StreetSquash provides intensive, individualized ACT preparation for all 11th grade students.

College Visits:

Every year StreetSquash participants tour a range of colleges throughout New York State and the Northeast.

College Prep Mentors:

In 12th grade, each StreetSquash participant is paired with a College Prep Mentor. Each pair meets weekly with students to support their college applications.

College Guidance:

Participants and their families receive individualized support to build a college list, apply to a wide range of schools, complete financial aid applications, and choose the school that is the best fit.

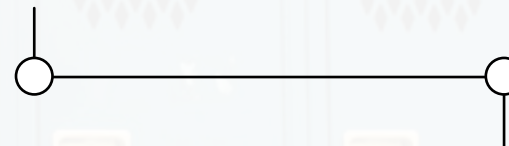

Now a junior at SUNY New Paltz, Daniel continues to emerge as a leader and aspiring professional, taking advantage of every opportunity possible. "There are so many different aspects of StreetSquash that are valuable," Daniel says, "but it is all of the different components combined that makes StreetSquash the wonderful program it is today."

Throughout Daniel's time at StreetSquash, he consistently exemplified the characteristics of a responsible young man who understood the importance of hard work. Daniel's driven attitude allowed him to thrive at StreetSquash, where he was given the space and support to excel in school and beyond. "I always took full advantage of my academic

sessions," Daniel explains, "StreetSquash was the only place where I could truly focus on my work."

Since graduating from high school, Daniel has remained a vibrant student who stays connected to StreetSquash as an active member of the alumni network. During school breaks, Daniel regularly returns to StreetSquash to speak in college prep sessions, and to share his experience with current high school students. "I love the family environment at StreetSquash. I always feel at home when I visit the building; whether it was in high school when I was a participant, or even now as an alum of the program, StreetSquash feels like home."

Last spring, Daniel reached out to StreetSquash to talk about his interest in Psychology, and asked for guidance on how

he could pursue a career in this field. Daniel was connected with a friend of StreetSquash, a professor at City College of New York, who invited Daniel to work in the Psychology Center for the summer. With the help of the StreetSquash Internship Stipend, Daniel was able to work in this placement full-time during the summer months, and to take on additional projects such as developing a proposal for a Sports Psychology extension for their Clinical Psychology PhD program.

This fall, Daniel's brother, Igor, joined him at SUNY New Paltz. StreetSquash is pleased to continue to support the Ramirez brothers as they navigate through college, and looks forward to Daniel and Igor's next milestone, college graduation, in 2018 and 2020 respectively.

A STREETSQUASH FAMILY: REN, RYAN AND RAYA

Ren Murrell first learned of StreetSquash when her son, Ryan, came home from Opportunity Charter School with an application to enroll in the program.

"Absolutely not," Ren told Ryan, "you're not doing it."

Ren had her reservations about the program. She didn't know the neighborhood well and she didn't want Ryan walking home alone at night. Soon after her conversation with Ryan, however, Ren received a phone call from RJ Keating, the Squash Director for the 7th and 8th grade teams at StreetSquash. "He made a promise to me. He told me that Ryan is going to love the program and that he will be safe there," Ren explained. The following day Ryan had his first practice at StreetSquash, and the rest is history.

"StreetSquash is like a family to us," Ren says. Ryan, who has been in the program for four years, and her daughter, Raya, who has been a participant for two years, come to the StreetSquash Center at least four days a week.

"I love playing squash. I never want to stop," Ryan says.

"Me too," says Raya, "and I love all my friends here."

When Ryan and Raya aren't with their friends on the squash courts, they can be found in the classrooms, working on their homework and preparing for their futures ahead.

"StreetSquash is a huge help with my homework," says Ryan. "I never felt comfortable asking questions in school. It's different at StreetSquash, I can ask for help with my homework or when I'm studying for a test. I get so much support from my academic sessions."

In addition to bi-weekly academic sessions, Ryan attends a weekly college prep session, mandatory for all high school participants. "I've already learned so much about college, things I never would have known about without StreetSquash. I learned about CUNY schools and SUNY schools, how to get into college, and what you need to do to apply to college."

Ryan will continue his weekly college prep sessions throughout high school, as will Raya once she enters her freshman year. They will apply to college, they will receive acceptance to college, they will enroll in college, and they will graduate from college, all with the help and guidance of StreetSquash staff along the way.

Ryan and Raya are not the only ones who benefit from the program; Ren is also an active member of the StreetSquash community. She has twice participated in Parent Journey, a weekly group run by the Senior Director of Social Work. She attends monthly Family Leadership Board meetings, she comes to tournaments, and she constantly supports her children, all while pursuing her Master's degree from John Jay College of Criminal Justice.

"Parent Journey is a safe haven. It is my sanctuary," says Ren. "We talk, we laugh, we cry. I make new friends and we network; they help me, I help them in return. It is a true support system."

Now, Ren laughs when she recalls that moment many years ago when she told Ryan she wouldn't let him attend StreetSquash. "I had my doubts in the beginning, and now every day since then I thank god I signed my name," she says. "At StreetSquash they learn, they have fun, they go on trips, they receive scholarships. I'm so happy they have somewhere to be. They could be in the streets, but instead they are here, at StreetSquash, staying safe, busy and happy, and for that, I am grateful."

STREETSQUASH NEWARK

StreetSquash Newark was founded in 2012, as a sister program to StreetSquash Harlem. Now serving 52 students in 4 grades, StreetSquash Newark runs sessions at the Newark Y and the YMCA of Montclair. StreetSquash Newark partners with two schools: Eagle Academy for Young Men, and University High School.

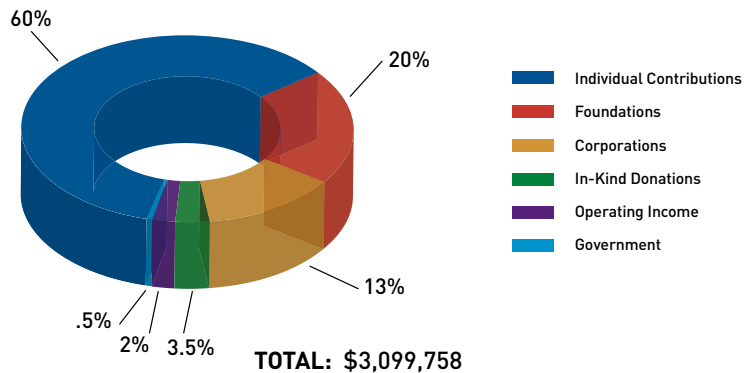

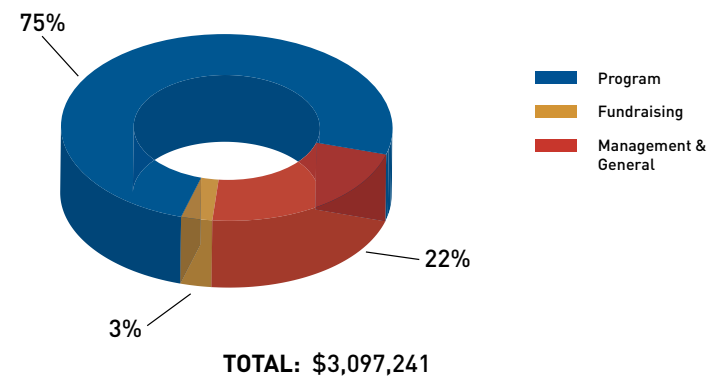
